At Stanton School we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of the children. We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and extra-curricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of all our children.

Our Primary School PE and Sports Premium Funding will enable us to continue and extend our provision through employing additional sports professionals, entering into more competitive sports competitions and training our staff to deliver in-house quality PE sessions.

What is the PE and Sport Premium?

The government is providing substantial primary school PE and sport funding per annum. The funding is being provided by the Secretary of State for Education, and will see money going directly to primary school headteachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children. In October 2020 the Primary PE and Sport Premium doubled so each school will receive £16,000 plus an extra £10 per child each year based on the number of children in years 3 to 6. At Stanton School we received £19,120 for the 2022-2023 academic year. The money can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

Purpose of the funding

Schools will have to spend the PE and sport funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

How to use PE and Sport Premium:

- provide staff with professional development, mentoring, training and resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- introduce new sports, dance or other activities to encourage more pupils to take up sport and physical activities
- support and involve the least active children by providing targeted activities, and running or extending school sports and holiday clubs
- encourage pupils to take on leadership or volunteer roles that support sport and physical activity within the school
- provide additional swimming provision targeted to pupils not able to meet the swimming requirements of the national curriculum
- embed physical activity into the school day through active travel to and from school
- encourage active play during break times and lunchtimes
- increase participation in the [School Games](#)
- provide opportunities for children to develop leadership skills
